**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**

**THOUGHTS**  
In several communities, I have noticed with concern the indifference to religion, especially of school children who are not being developed spiritually, a necessity to a well-balanced education.

Would the parents of these children care to rear them under a Hitlerite system of education, where the state system is the religion? I call your attention to the Declaration of Independence. "We hold these truths to be self-evident—that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Notice this document says all men ARE CREATED EQUAL. They were not evolved equal, they did not just happen. But, where did this idea come from? Where did our founding-fathers get this idea? There is only one answer—They were God-fearing men and had a deep reverence for the Word of God, and were students of the same. Note the quotations below and see how closely they resemble the principles set forth in the Declaration of Independence. Gen. 1:27, "And God created man in His own image." Acts 17:26, "He hath made of one blood all nations of men." Gal. 3:28, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, neither bond nor free, neither male nor female—for ye are all one in Christ." Gal. 5:1, "For freedom did Christ set us free." John 8:32, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

I say we live in a free country where we have the greatest degree of freedom on the face of the earth—Because men believed in God. It will only remain free as long as men believe in God. Men will only believe in God because they have been taught of God. Neighbor, are you seeing that your children are being taught of God? Are you taking them to church where they receive spiritual training?

I believe this principle was brought to our attention by Lincoln, "That the government of the people, for the people and by the people shall not perish from the earth. Yes, this too is a Bible principle. Where Lincoln got it I do not know, but in the preface to the Wycliff Bible of 1332 we read, "The Bible is a government of the people, for the people, by the people."
