

K. CLUB HAS V-E DAY EXERCISES

Four Local Ministers Give Short Addresses

Kiwanians of the city celebrated V-E day at their regular meeting Tuesday noon at the Portia club house with four short addresses by local ministers, who addressed the spiritual significance of the day.

The Rev. Paul Felthouse of the Baptist church told of three different attitudes of people toward the day and expressed them as V-E standing for Victory in Europe; V-E as standing for the time when there would be Victory Everywhere; and V-E which will mean Victory that will Endure.

The Rev. Frank Gosser of the Christian church displayed a picture that he had cut from an issue of the Idaho Statesman showing a mother and father standing over the grave of a soldier son and called attention to the fact that V-E day should be a day of prayer and Thanksgiving. He also pointed out the number of references to God and to God's help that came through the press and radio from allied military leaders.

The Rev. Earl Williams of the Nazarene church likened the day unto the biblical time when Moses led the children of Israel out of the wilderness and received the admonition: "Speak unto the people that they go forward."

The Rev. A. F. Lienkaemper of the Evangelical Reformed church told of the hilarity which he said was a carousal following World War I and said he was much pleased with the general spirit being shown at the present time over the Victory in Europe.

Weldon Fuge was program chairman. Prior to the addresses George Sedlmayer, president of the club read the letter which will be found elsewhere in this issue from the Kiwanis International president.

There was also the usual group singing and introduction of guests. Herman Welker, local attorney, was introduced as a new member.

Support To Include Heavier Hogs

The recently announced price support of \$13 per hundredweight for hogs now includes hogs weighing up to 300 pounds, WPA Administrator Marvin Jones advises. A relatively favorable feed situation and great need for fats and oils account for this increase at this time. The support was raised to \$13 to encourage farmers to increase their fall pig farrowings to meet the higher goal, and will continue in effect until September 1, 1946.

Bonus Bonds May Be Cashed Soon

Postmaster L. M. Bowman announced this week that veterans of World War I who have adjusted service bonds (bonus bonds) which mature June 15, should file their applications with him for payment as soon after May 15 as possible, to avoid the rush and confusion which will come if all wait until the last minute.

Upon filing of the necessary information with the local postmaster, he will issue a receipt for the bonds. They will then be sent to the Federal Reserve Bank at San Francisco and payment will come from there, direct to the owners of the bonds.

He said no further interest will accrue on the bonds after June 15. They are not exchangeable for other government bonds, but authorities are urging those who care to do so, to cash the bonds, and then re-invest the money in Series E war bonds.

FCA To Dispose Of Surplus Lands

Secretary Wickard has named the Farm Credit Administration to dispose of surplus agricultural and forest lands no longer needed for war purposes which the Surplus property board assigns, to the Department of Agriculture. Under the Surplus Property Act, federal, state, county and municipal agencies and specified types of institutions have first preference in purchase of such lands. Former owners have next preference, followed by former tenants of land that was rented when the government bought it. Any remainder will be divided into economic units and offered, first, to veterans of this war and persons now in military service; and afterwards to the general public.

enemy action and crashed in flames near the 113th Cavalry's forward positions along the Roer river. After daybreak an observer with field glasses, spotted a wounded flier lying in the water at the bank of the river in no-mans-land, and upon hearing this, T/5 Ruse, together with T/5 Marvin M. Young of Reanoke, Va., asked and received permission to attempt a rescue.

These two cavalry troopers, accustomed to being under enemy observation, crossed an 800 yard open field, exposed themselves to sweeping machine gun fire, and waded through waist deep water to accomplish the rescue. The wounded British flier was brought back safely and evacuated through medical channels. Both men have been recommended for the Bronze Star.

Captain Hess Wins Silver Star

Word has come from the Eighth Air Force that the Silver Star has been awarded to Capt. William P. Hess for gallantry in action while supporting heavy bombers on a penetration mission deep in Germany. While leading a squadron of twelve P-51s, Capt. Hess and his squadron met approximately sixty enemy fighters. After destroying one, he reformed the squadron and went to the assistance of the bombers under attack by fifty enemy fighters. He pursued one of them down to five hundred feet where the pilot bailed out. Climbing for altitude, he engaged and destroyed the third FW-109. This action terminated over an enemy airdrome. Although alone, he strafed the field and set fire to a JU-87 before withdrawing due to his depleted fuel supply. Captain Hess' cool and zealous leadership and indomitable fighting spirit were dominating factors in dispersing the enemy before serious damage could be inflicted on the bombers. He entered service from Idaho, Capt. Hess also has been awarded the Air Medal with five Oak Leaf clusters, the DFC and has four major battles to his credit. Capt. Hess is now back in the States stationed at Luke Field, Arizona. He will soon go to instruction school with the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Bergmann, 510 North 6th St., Payette.

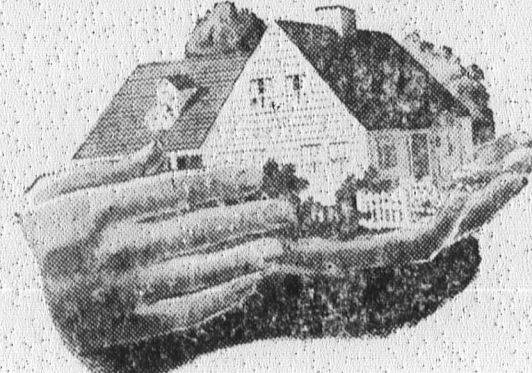
