## Damaged By Fall

A fall may damage the thermostat of an iron or throw it out of adjustment. July of that year he enlisted in the Navy and was assigned to the engineering department of Pan-American Airways at Seattle. In February, 1944 he asked to be assigned to active duty and, after being commissioned Ensign, received Radar training. On May 11, 1945, while on a routine training flight, he was instantly killed in an airplane accident at the Naval Air station, Bannan River, Florida.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. R. McClure, two brothers, Raymond, a Naval radio technician first class, now on Okinawa, and James, a Naval aviation cadet at Norman, Oklahoma; a sister, Jean, of Payette; a grandmother, Mrs. A. R. McClure and an aunt, Miss Mamie McClure, both of Payette.

He has been a member of the Payette Methodist church since he was twelve years of age.
