### NOTICE OF SPECIAL SCHOOL MEETING AND ELECTION IN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 32, IN THE COUNTY OF PAYETTE, IN THE STATE OF IDAHO.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That a special meeting and election of the qualified voters of the above named school district will be held on the 5th day of June, A. D., 1945, at the High School Building of the District in the City and County of Payette, State of Idaho, at which meeting and election it shall be determined by a majority vote of the qualified voters present and voting, as to whether or not a levy in addition to the levy authorized without an election, shall be authorized for the support and maintenance of the school of the district out of the General Fund in an amount not exceeding Seven (7) Mills for the fiscal year commencing on the First day of July, A. D., 1945. The Board of Trustees having declared that an emergency exists and recommended that One (1) Mill be levied in addition to Seven (7) Mills that might be levied upon approval of the qualified voters of the District voting a special election called for that purpose without the approval of the State Board of Education and said State Board of Education having approved the levying of said One (1) Mill in addition to said additional Seven (7) Mill levy, making said total Eight (8) Mill levy in addition to the levy that might be made without the approval of such voters at such Special Election.

ANY PERSON HAVING THE FOLLOWING QUALIFICATION MAY VOTE AT SUCH ELECTION:

Every male or female citizen of the United States, twenty-one years of age, who has actually resided within the State of Idaho for six months in the County of Payette 30 days next preceding the day of election, AND WHO IN ADDITION POSSESSES ONE OF THE TWO FOLLOWING QUALIFICATIONS, to-wit:

1. Parents or Guardians of a child or children when such child or children are under twenty-one years of age, and when such child or children and the parents or guardians thereof, are residents of such district at the time of election; or

2. A person who pays taxes within the district, and the husband or wife of such tax payer, in case the tax payer is married, a payer of poll taxes is not a tax payer within the meaning of Section 33-322 Idaho Code Annotated.

The right is reserved to reject all proposals, or to accept the proposal or proposals deemed best for the State of Idaho.

No proposals will be considered unless accompanied by an acceptable Proposal Guaranty in an amount not less than 5 per cent of the total amount of the Proposal. This guar-

anty may be in the form of (a) cash, (b) a certified check or cashier's check drawn on an Idaho bank, made payable to the Commissioner, or (c) a bidder's bond.

It is the purpose of the Commissioner to build the improvements in the shortest time consistent with good construction. Necessary equipment and an effective organization will be insisted upon.

The attention of the bidders is directed to Section 108.01 of the 1941 State Standard Specifications covering subletting or assigning the contract.

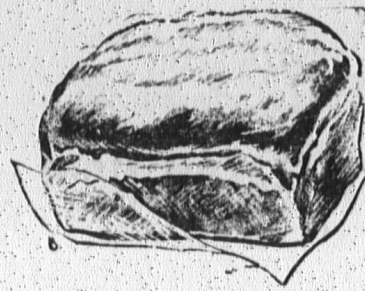

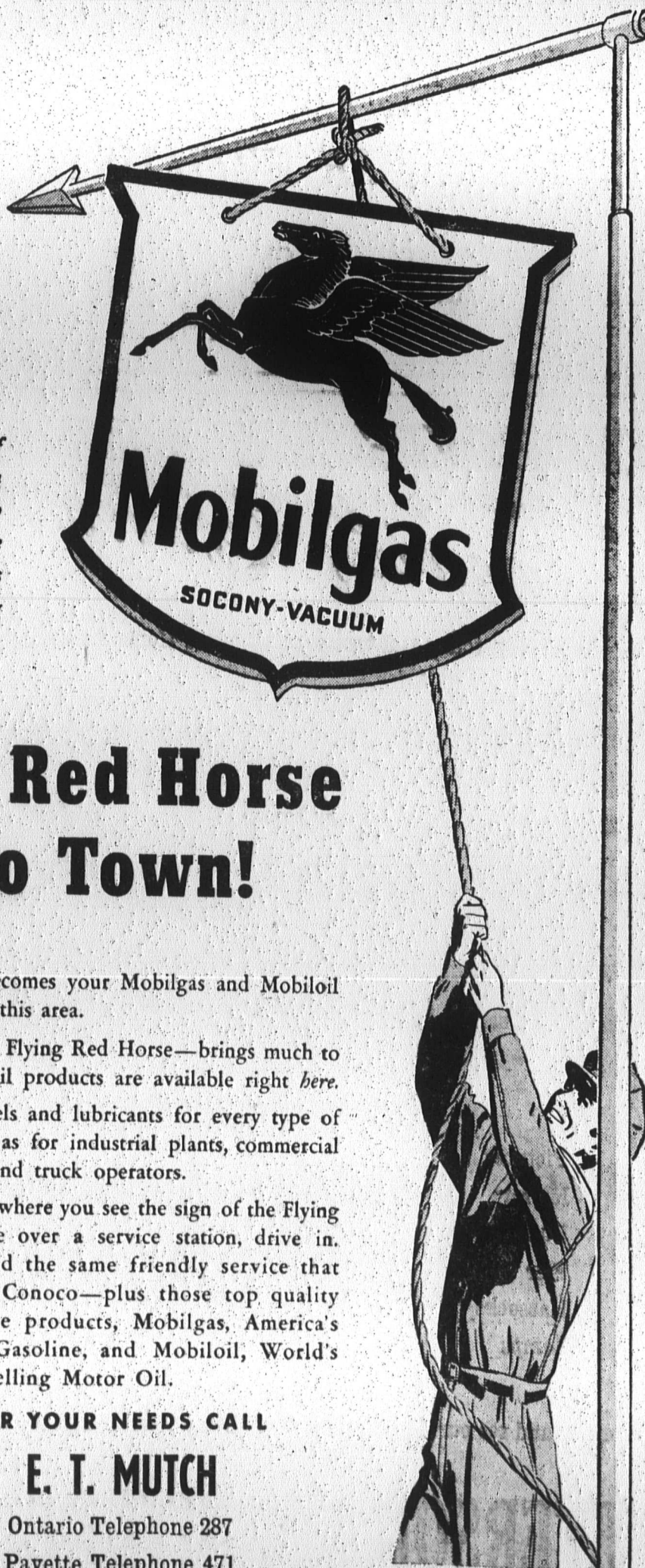
