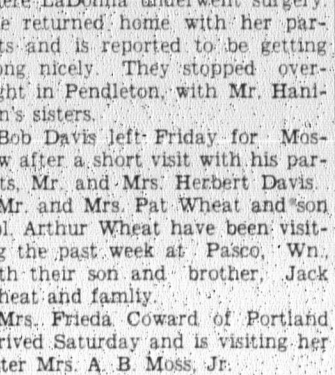

**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**

**DON'T THROW THE SWITCH**  
Not many years ago a brakeman stood by a switch at a siding where two crack passenger trains were to pass. As the onrushing train approached he looked at the switch, became confused and threw the switch. He made a fatal mistake. The trains crashed head on. Many lives were lost. The fact that he was honest, did his best, and had been an old hand, faithful to his work, did not bring one of the victims back to life again.

Preachers sometimes become confused and throw the switch when they should leave it alone. The claim that they are honest, intelligent, upright and doing the best they know will not help much when people are being led astray. Jesus said that when the blind lead the blind they both fall into the ditch. Just as the light of the switch was so plain there was no excuse for confusion, so with many plain passages of scripture that the switch is thrown on—there is no need for misunderstanding. Let us try a few.

"He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Mk. 16:16. Preacher man why do you throw the switch and make it read, "He that believeth and is saved shall be baptized?"

"Therefore we are buried with him by baptism." Rom. 6:4. How say you a little sprinkle will do the job?

Paul said "Christ loved the church and gave himself for it." Eph. 5:25. And Christ said "Upon this rock I will build my church." Mt. 16:18. Shall we throw the switch and say it does not make any difference which one?

The switch has both a green light and a red light. The red is for danger. Here it is preacher friend—Gal. 1:8, "Though we or an angel

from heaven preach any other gospel than that which we preached unto you let him be accursed." HERE IS THE GREEN LIGHT MY FRIEND—1 Tim. 4:1-3, "I charge thee in the sight of God and of Jesus Christ . . . preach the word . . . wrong; BUT the Bible is right and for men will not endure sound doctrine." Read the whole passage, then come to the Fruitland Church of Christ where the Word is preached without partiality. I may be right, I may be wrong; You may be right, You may be wrong; BUT the Bible is right and cannot possibly be wrong.
