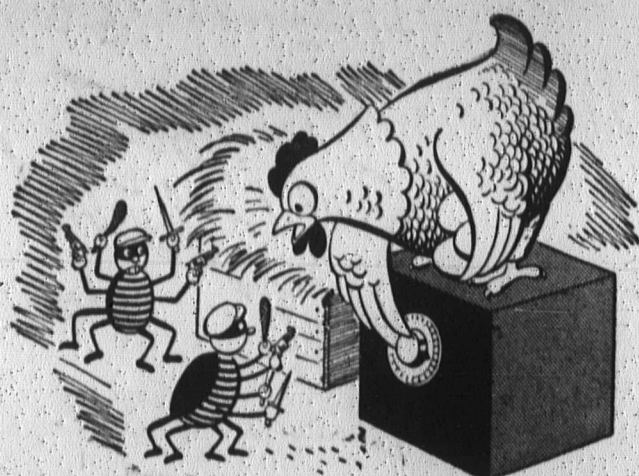

Miss Jimilee Brown returned Monday to Sandpoint.

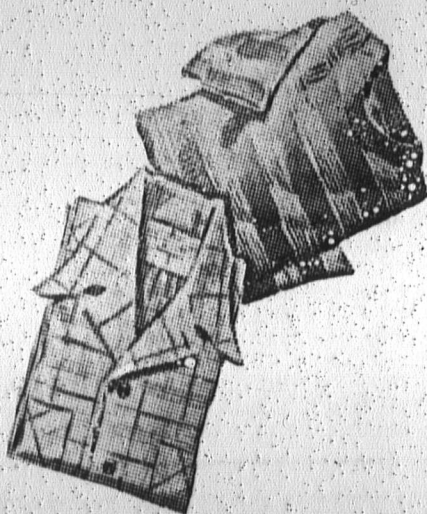

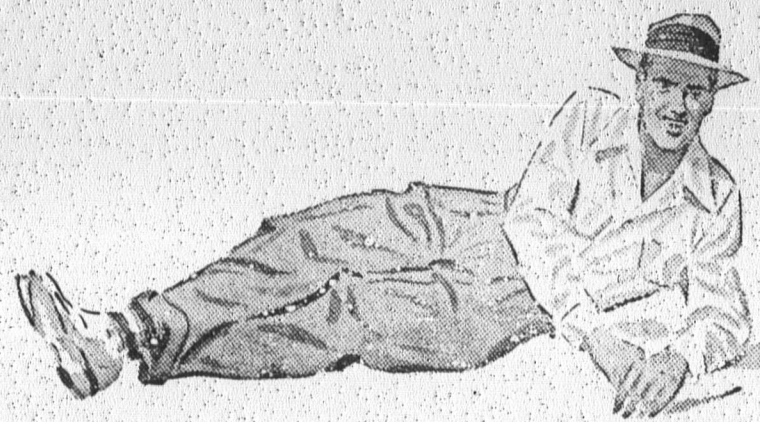
