

NAMPA WILL HOLD SNAKE RIVER STAMPEDE

The Snake River Stampede, more billed as "the wildest, fastest show spectacular than last year and again on earth," will be presented in Nampa July 12, 13 and 14 by Leo J. Cremer of Montana.

The rodeo will be an evening affair on all three dates just as it was a year ago. Fans will recall that last year in Nampa they saw a dozen of the nation's top buckaroos vie with the best Idaho cowhands to test their skill at sticking Cremer's bucking horses, and that calf roping and bulldogging time was the best ever seen here. These features are promised to be better than ever this time with even more big-name cowboys than before.

Mexican steers, never before bulldogged will be shipped directly to Nampa from old Mexico and new Brahma bulls will be on hand, as well as Barrel Head and Jumbo, favorites of last year's show.

CAMP MAXEY, Texas. — Pvt. Ralph R. Kelso, husband of Hilda M. Kelso of Gresham, Oregon, is on his way toward becoming a fighting American infantryman, having arrived at Camp Maxey, Texas, for training. The soldier will be schooled at the Infantry Replacement Training center at Camp Maxey, and will graduate as a rifleman, or heavy weapons expert—the best equipped and best trained doughboy of any army in the world.

Pvt. Kelso will be taught combat tactics by soldier instructors who have returned from fighting overseas. Veterans of frontlines will show the new infantryman foxholes, trenches, bazookas and other American weapons.

Ira M. Nelson was born at Butler, Indiana Dec. 11, 1885. He was the second child of Mr. and Mrs. Healy Nelson. He moved to Nebraska while still a young man. On March 3, 1901 he was married to Jessie M. George, and in 1902 they came to Idaho and settled on a farm in Boise Valley where they reared their family. Mrs. Nelson was appointed by Gov. Moses Alexander in 1916 as a member of a committee to make the original survey of the North and South Highway. He served on this committee until its completion.

In 1938 they moved to New Plymouth to be near their daughter, Mrs. Nelson died June 3, 1942. The Nelson family consisted of one daughter and seven sons, six of whom survive. They are: Walter J. of Hollywood, Cal.; George A. with the civil engineers at Skagway, Alaska; Edward J. of Weiser, T/I; Merle A. in the Philippines; T/I Clarence A. in Kessler, Germany; and Mrs. Ethel Burkes of New Plymouth. Two sons, Ross and Ernest preceded their father in death. He also leaves eight grandchildren, one brother, Samuel of Boise, and one sister, Mrs. Delphina Barnes of Butler, Ind.

SGT. JONES WORKS ON ASSEMBLY LINE

AN AIR SERVICE COMMAND DEPOT, England. — The thousands of aerial sorties which helped defeat the German armies on both sides of the Rhine meant extra effort for S. Sgt. Eugene V. Jones of 703 9th street, Sacramento, Calif., son of Mrs. S. E. Jones of Payette.

Working at top speed on the vast engine overhauling assembly line at this great Air Service Command repair and modification depot, he and his fellow soldier-technicians turned out 2,277 aircraft engines for front-line action during one month.

In commending S. Sgt. Jones for the production feat, Brigadier General Morris Berman of San Antonio disclosed that: "This figure smashed existing record for engine repair for the third successive month and has been a decisive factor in making an early victory possible."

A soldier since June, 1943 he has been overseas 20 months. He was formerly employed by Sacramento Air Depot, Sacramento, Cal., and attended Sacramento high school.

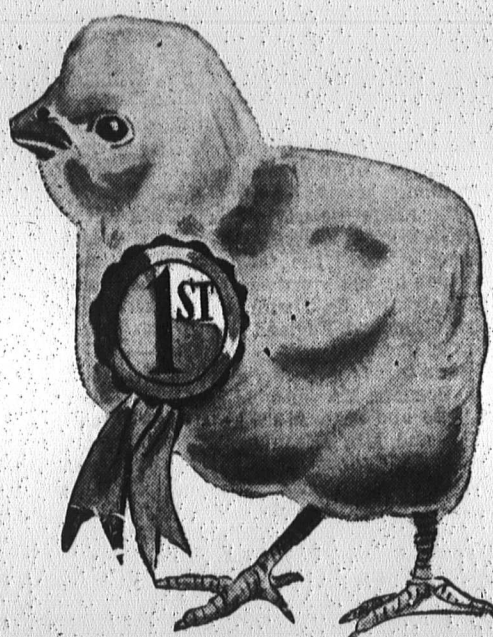
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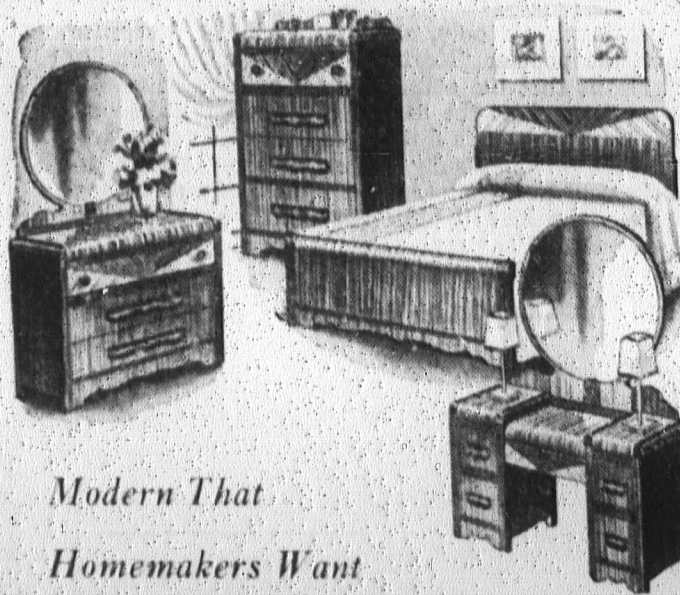
