Polishing Wood

To polish wood, use equal parts of turpentine and boiled linseed oil. Apply thinly with a polishing cloth using even strokes. Rub against the grain of the wood, then in straight lines with the grain. Wood should have time to absorb oil. Then rub it thoroughly. Repeat the process until a satiny gloss results. Good results depend largely on the rubbing.

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners acting as a Board of Equalization. Payette, June 25, 1945. 10:30 o'clock a.m. First Day. Present: Jno. R. McKinney, chairman, Edward Mess and S. L. Pomeroy, commissioners, Grace Abbott, assessor, W. R. McClure, prosecuting attorney and Lillian Wilson, clerk.

This being the fourth Monday of June, 1945, the Board of County Commissioners meets as a Board of Equalization, as per Sec. 61-401, I. C. A. for the purpose of equalizing the assessment of property on the Real Property roll and determining complaints in regard to the assessment of such property and allowing or disallowing exemptions claimed under sub-divisions 4, 6 and 7, of Sections 61-105 and 107 ICA as amended, affecting the assessment of property entered upon said roll, and the Board under Sec. 61-402 examines the Real Property Roll, tract by tract, and the valuation of each assessment and acts upon all claims in accordance with said section. The following persons appear and in turn make application for tax exemption under sub-division 4 Sec. 61-105 ICA as amended: Eleanor Wherry, Patricia Ruby Decker,

Minnie L. Fulbright, Alice V. Heim, Frances Wayne, and Elsie Shook Edwards. The board being fully advised grants same.

3:30 p.m. the Board recesses to meet as a Board of County Commissioners.

Second day, July 2, 1945. 10 o'clock a.m. All members present. The board continues with the examination and equalization of the Real Property Roll.

Tax exemptions under sub-division 4, Sec. 61-105 ICA, as amended are considered granted and ordered entered upon the rolls of the County: Ana A. Moss; Daisy Gamble whose husband is in the armed forces by agent Al Gamble, and Clyde E. Putnam veteran of World War I. Jessie Williams is considered and denied for the reason that no property was assessed in her name, January 1945.

Third day, July 9, 1945. 9:30 o'clock a.m. All members present. This being the second Monday of July 1945, the Board meets for the purpose of equalizing the assessment of property on the Personal Property Roll and to determine complaints in regard to the assessment of such property and allowing or disallowing claims for tax exemptions under the Statute. Claims for tax exemptions under sub-division 4 SEC. 61-105 ICA as amended are considered, granted and ordered entered upon the assessment roll of the county as follows: Sarah A. Coates by her agent Earl Coates; Maude Manser by her agent Kathryn D. Yost and Marie Forsman, whose husband is in the armed forces.

Fourth day, July 16, 1945. 10:30 o'clock a.m. All members present. The Board continues with the examination and equalization of the Real and Personal Property Rolls. Claims for tax exemption under Sec. 61-104 ICA as amended are considered, granted and ordered entered upon the Property Assessment Rolls of Payette county as follows: Elizabeth Fitzsimons and Catherine Short Alsbaugh.

1:30 o'clock the board recesses to meet as a board of county commissioners.

4:45 o'clock the board reconvenes as a Board of Equalization. This being the third Monday of July and this Board having completed all business as a Board of Equalization affecting the assessments of property entered upon the Real and Personal Property Rolls does hereby deliver said Real and Personal Property Rolls with all charges, corrections, exemptions and additions thereon to the Auditor, and there being no further business, this Board of Equalization adjourns sine die.

Payette, Idaho, July 16, 1945. 10 o'clock a.m. The Board of County Commissioners meets after recess of July 9, 1945. All members present. The minutes of July 2 and 9, 1945 are read and approved.

10:00 o'clock a.m. the Board recesses to meet as a Board of Equalization. 1:45 o'clock p.m. the Board reconvenes as a Board of County Commissioners.

The tax settlement between the Tax Collector and Auditor is read and approved as follows: Taxes charged to Tax Collector 1944 Real Property Roll \$221,561.74. Personal property taxes transferred to and adjustments on Real Roll \$213.68. Total charge \$221,775.42. 1944 Taxes collected at first collection \$160,210.50. 1944 taxes delinquent at first collection \$4,792.03. Collected at second collection \$52,638.31. Delinquent \$4,290.16. Credits by adjustment vouchers \$44.22. Total \$221,975.62. Recess.

July 30, 1945. 10 o'clock a.m. All members present. Minutes of July 16, and Equalization Board minutes read and approved. Louie Grischowsky and Clarence James having purchased Pete's Place from Arthur Yates and having paid the transfer fee of \$5.00 a license is order issued in lieu of No. 18. Recess. July 30, 1945. 10 o'clock a.m. All members present. As per Chapter 16, 1939 Session Laws as

amended it is hereby ordered that the sum of \$2,031.95 be apportioned to Highway District No. 1 and \$772.60 be apportioned to Highway District No. 2, and the same is hereby transferred to said Highway.

This being the time for hearing on the application of Casey G. Donohue for a license to conduct a public pool hall in the Conover building at Fruitland, he having paid the license fee and filed a bond and no one appearing and objecting. It is hereby Ordered that license be issued.

Forgery and check alteration Insurance on the check protector, owned and used by the County is hereby approved and ordered filed.

After due consideration of bids received on a carload of oiled stack coal, the bid of VanPetten Lumber Company is accepted.

Harold H. Gurnsey having placed his resignation on file, the Board take sit under consideration. Recess August 6, 1945. 10:30 a.m.

All members present. The minutes of July 23 and 30th are read and approved.

It is hereby ordered that a claim of \$15.30 against the City of Payette for destroying noxious weeds, on the streets and alleys, is hereby cancelled.

Insurance of 11 Ton. LaCrosse trailer covering bodily injury and property damage is approved and ordered filed.

The resignation of Harold H. Gurnsey to be effective as of August 27, 1945 is hereby accepted. adjourn.

August 13, 1945. 10 o'clock a.m. The board meets in regular session all members present.
