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The Privilege It Is To Be An American Citizen

J. C. Palumbo, one of Payette's most prominent citizens said in effect in a little sincere talk to a group of businessmen the other night: "It takes one born in a foreign land to fully appreciate the privilege it is to be an American citizen."

How true his words are. He who saw overcrowded conditions in Europe with absolute rule by dictators and monarchs with little opportunity for anyone to rise above the class in which he was born, and most of the common people having to work long and ceaselessly to eke out an existence with little luxury, knows deep in his heart, the golden opportunities that life in America affords.

On the other hand we who are born in America and have lived here all our lives so far, have no such basis of comparison. The American way of life has become commonplace to us. We have taken it for granted and probably worst of all we have become indifferent to the infinitely more opportunities offered here than in other countries. It takes men like Mr. Palumbo, who have come from across the sea to make us in a measure appreciate what we have.

Probably too, more than we realize it has been the large influx of thousands from European countries who have become assimilated as citizens, which has provided the steady influence to make this country the greatest in the twentieth century world.

The End Of The "Gravy Train"

Indications point strongly to the fact that the end is in sight for the "gravy train" that a lot of people have been riding during the war days.

It was indeed a "gravy train deluxe" when both unskilled men and women could go to defense centers of the country and draw a dollar an hour and upwards for little or no work—where the general attitude and unwritten instructions were "to act like you are busy and do as little as possible."

Last Thursday night, just about ten days after V-J Day, daily newspapers showed pictures of long lines of people in Detroit, Mich. waiting in long lines to sign up for work. An accompanying news item stated that there were 250,000 people unemployed in the city of Detroit alone.

Undoubtedly similar pictures could be taken in many of the other larger cities in the country, as these conditions go, starting in the larger cities they will soon fan out to the smaller cities of the Nation.

It can easily be seen that a turn has come in the long lane and that instead of labor laying the upper hand as it has during the war, it is going to be the employer's turn to be boss again.

Incidentally too, the average employer has a good memory. He is going to remember the loyal employee who stuck with him through the years and is going to take with a grain of salt, the pleas and promises of the "gravy train" riders, when they return mournfully begging for their old jobs back again.

What British Socialism Means

As the excitement over the surprise victory of the British Labor Party dies down, it becomes possible to see a little more clearly what this victory means—and also what it does not mean. It means:

1. That, because of its substantial majority (more than two-thirds of the seats in the House of Commons) the Labor Party will have a full five years in office. British law—suspended during the war—calls for a national election at least once in every five years. In the past, however, elections have usually been called at more frequent intervals. This was because governments, lacking a strong majority and therefore depending upon coalition support, were frequently forced to resign by a vote of no confidence, even though such a vote sometimes reflected only a minor shift in the political scene.

2. That, during the next five years, public utilities, transportation facilities, fuel, Bank of England, perhaps the large private banks and some of the major industries will be greatly nationalized.

3. That the maintenance of full employment and the provision of decent housing and living conditions, rather than nationalization for the sake of socialistic theory, have become the chief objectives of the British government.

On the other hand it is clear that the Labor victory does not mean:

1. That Britain will rush headlong into complete socialism or that private enterprise will be eliminated.

2. That there will be any collectivization or nationalization of the ownership of land.

3. That Britain's traditional Parliamentary democracy is in any way threatened by totalitarianism.

In foreign affairs the Attlee government will pursue a course of continued close cooperation with the U. S. and the U. S. S. R. On the other hand the Tory policy of supporting Franco in Spain and unpopular kings in Greece, Yugoslavia, Italy and Belgium will be supplanted by a policy of supporting the aspirations of peoples rather than the vested interests of regimes.

Even though unpopular in England we must join with the rest of America in the decision of President Truman to bring lease lend to an abrupt close with the cessation of hostilities. Britain was critical, this way to be expected. America applauds a policy which will require other nations to pay for what they get in America. This is a matter of sound business and ultimately will result in the building of a more stable Britain.

Although the water was turned out of the upper ditch and all day Sunday was spent in looking for the body of J. C. Davis, the man who was watchman at Ratton's Point and who suddenly disappeared two weeks ago, it was not found and the search was given up.

They told him that he was the first man to take the \$5 in seven years.

A communication has been received from the Settle-Gilmore party which is camping in the wilds at Bear. They report hunting good, plenty of grouse, fine water and big appetites. The best thing thus far in the hunting line is the bagging of a 300 pound black bear.

E. G. Dunn, proprietor of Dunn's Ice Cream Parlor and Confectionery Store, has made arrangements to open a restaurant in the building formerly occupied by Creamery Cafe. Mr. Dunn plans a clean, modern restaurant and will be open for business the first of next week.
