Pvt. Leland Maust, of Camp Wolters, Texas is spending a fifteen day furlough here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Haust.

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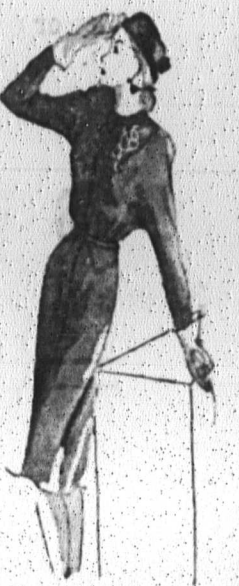
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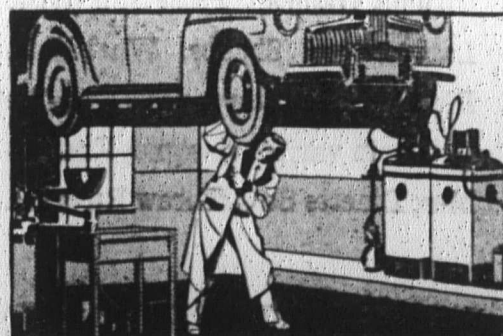
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
