Idaho Power Co. Announces Post-war Improvement Plan

Launching its post-war construction program for the purpose of providing farms, homes and industries with increasing amounts of electric power, Idaho Power Company has announced the awarding of contracts to Morrison Knudsen Company, Idaho construction firm, for the immediate building of a new power plant, together with its substation facilities, and 120 miles of electric transmission line.

Men and equipment are to start moving to the sites of construction Sept. 19.

The electric plant and line construction, previously announced, will include a hydro-electric generating station at the company's Upper Salmon site in Snake river canyon south of Hagerman and a 138,000-volt transmission line from Hagerman valley electric plants to Boise

and Emmett. The company will also build substations or switching installations at Lower Salmon, Boise, Emmett and Mountain Home.

County, whether it was bonds, Red Cross or war relief, was accomplished one hundred per cent and more. It has been apparent as the various war relief activities were undertaken that due to the permanent organization of the Victory Crew in Payette County, activity was gotten under way promptly while it was noticeable in newspaper reports that many counties were seriously

delayed in their activity by the necessity of forming a new organization for each separate activity.

The activities of the Victory Crew have involved a great deal of time on the part of all members of the organization and in many cases the use of their personal automobiles and limited supply of gasoline under the rationing program.

When the organization was originally formed, it was agreed that it would remain permanently organized and carry the responsibility for all bond sales and war relief programs throughout the county, and Col. Moss has requested that his appreciation be expressed to all members of the Victory Crew for the excellent work they have done without compensation and in many cases have borne their own personal expense over and above the amount of time which was required by each individual member. During the period of the war it was impossible to hold a luncheon meeting of the organization because of the rationing program and limited facilities for such meetings. Since conditions have changed to the extent that such a meeting is now possible, the Payette Chamber of Commerce has undertaken the entertainment of all Victory Crew members at a banquet. Weldon Fuge,

president of the Payette Chamber of Commerce, announced that there would be no charge to the members of the Victory Crew for the banquet, as the cost was being defrayed by ten or twelve commercial and industrial institutions throughout the county which had been most generous in their willingness to defray the cost of the banquet. Notice of the meeting and invitations to Victory Crew members have been sent out through the officers of the organization throughout the county.

It was stated by Col. Moss that, due to the fact that some members of the Victory Crew do not have telephones and because some of them were temporarily away from home on business or for some other reason could not be reached, every Victory Crew member should consider this news release as an invitation to attend the meeting, as a guest of the Payette Chamber of Commerce and Herman Welker will be the toastmaster for the evening. Col. Moss stated that the banquet was for members of the Victory Crew only as sitting facilities would make it impossible to invite other members of the family. He

expressed himself hopeful, however, that all members of the Victory Crew would attend.
