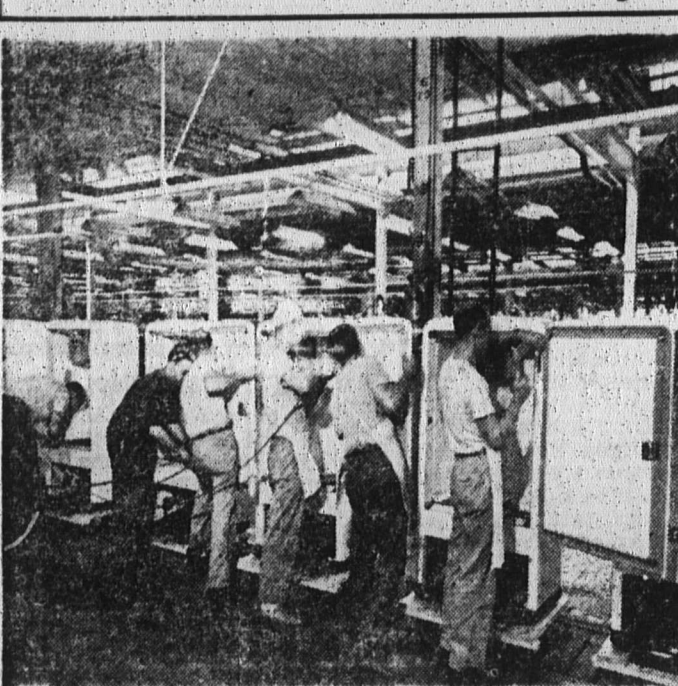
The young people of the Assembly of God Church gave a food shower last Thursday evening at the home of Mrs. Forseman honoring their

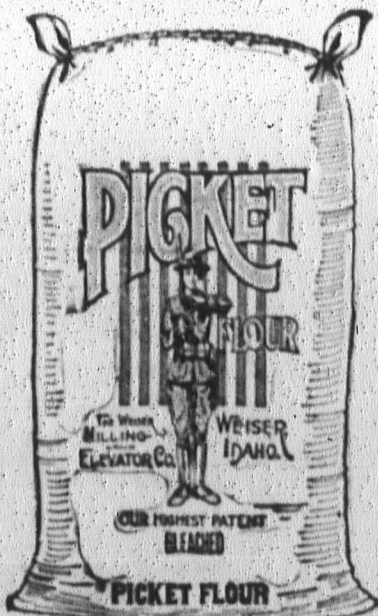
