COAST STORES TO SELL FURNITURE MADE IN PAYETTE

Marshall And Associates Report Many Good Contacts Made In California

In connection with converting the plant from the manufacture of war products back to making furniture.

Jack Marshall, Ursus Dalton and Ralph VanVerth of the Marshall Furniture Company returned Sunday from a very successful business trip throughout California, Oregon, and Nevada.

Marshall reports that at least 45 leading California furniture dealers and department stores have already been lined up to handle his line of furniture which consists of lawn, patio, bedroom and living room furniture made of knotty pine.

While in California, Mr. Marshall, Mr. VanVerth and Dalton met with Hugh McNair, sales representative of the local firm, who at the time was having a showing of the furniture at the Hayward Hotel in Los Angeles. While there a lease was taken at the Los Angeles furniture mart for an all year around office and show room for the permanent display of the various furniture items to be built at Marshalls.

Mr. Marshall states that he and his associates are seriously contemplating the erection of a furniture assembly plant at some centrally located spot in California. With a setup of this type the furniture parts would be processed at the Payette plant, and then shipped in carload lots to the assembly plant, thereby effecting considerable savings in the crating and freight costs. However even though this plan may be put into effect, the local plant will still employ between 75 and 100 people when it gets into full production.

4-H YOUNGSTERS TO GET CALVES

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Instead of the thirteen boys originally in on the deal one has been added and he will be sponsored by Leland Barber and the Payette Hardware.

Each of the other thirteen boys will have two businessmen or firms as sponsors. The sponsors underwrite the loan with which the boys buy their calves. The boys then take their calves and with the help of their parents feed and care for them. When the calves are ready for market a year hence, the boys first pay back the loans on the animals and then take the profits for themselves.

Her ports of call have included Pearl Harbor, Eniwetok, Saipan, Guam, Ulithi, Okinawa, Leyte, Hollandia in New Guinea, Noumea in New Caledonia, Manila, Zamboanga, and Kure and Tokyo in Japan.

POLICE ARREST RECKLESS DRIVER

Oregon Man Wrecks Car Trying To Elude Policeman

Ivan Haney, of Nyssa, gave Night Policeman Bob Garrett an exciting chase last Friday night until the Oregon man wrecked his car and the officer caught up with him a short distance from the city.

As a result of the wreck Haney spent several days in a hospital and later appeared in probate court here with a plea of guilty to a reckless driving charge and was meted out a fine of \$25 and costs by Judge W. S. Stephenson.

With Haney at the time of the wreck were Alvin and Ernest Paine of Ontario. Both were taken into custody at the time of the wreck but were later released.

Officer Garrett spotted the three men speeding on Eighth street and gave chase. He had gone only a short distance when he came upon the wrecked car, and found that Haney was hurt and needed medical aid. He took the injured man to the hospital and the other two to jail.

For sometime none of the three would admit driving the car, but after Haney got out of the hospital he confessed that he was the driver. The police turned the case over to the county authorities who took the case into Judge Stephenson's court.

Young Hodges, an employee of the Mueller Dairy, had been to Council on business and evidently went to sleep while driving. The car left the highway and went over three ditches before it came to a halt. The young man was knocked out for a time and when he regained consciousness sought assistance at a farm house about a mile away.

The farmer brought him into the Weiser hospital where he received first aid treatment. His parents were notified and they went to Weiser and brought him back to their home here later that night.

The young man had recovered sufficiently to resume work at the dairy this morning.

The car was brought to Payette Monday by the Hanigan Chevrolet company and it was estimated that the repairs would run between \$600 and \$700.

Night officer Bob Garrett received a tip that Bob and two companions, Arthur M. Helm and Joseph P. Wilson, who were here taking orders for photographs, the last of the week planned a burglary job either at Ontario or in this city. Garrett called the state police sergeant at Ontario and Chief of Police Cecil Rose and the three officers kept the three men under surveillance most of Saturday night. Finally they decided to arrest the three men for investigation and when they did they found Bob was armed with the two guns. They placed a charge of carrying concealed weapons against him the next day and he was fined \$100 when he appeared in police court Monday and he pleaded guilty to the charge. He had not paid the fine Wednesday and was being held in the county jail in lieu thereof. His two companions were released after questioning.

COUNTY SHORT ON BOND QUOTA

"E" Bond Only About 60 Percent Of Goal

Payette county so far has only approximately 60 per cent of its "E" bond quota and 33 1/3 per cent of its other bond goal in the Victory loan drive according to figures released this morning by Keith Anderson, county war bond secretary.

In addition to the above Anderson reported there is approximately \$15,000 of allocations from larger concerns doing business in this county to the "other bond" quota.

Quotas set for the county were: "E" bonds \$126,000 and other bonds \$86,000 making a grand total of \$309,000.

Col. W. H. Moss, county war bond chairman, is deeply concerned over the situation. He felt prior to the drive that due to the small quota and the good investment bonds provide, that it would only be a matter of a few days before the full quota would be subscribed. He is therefore again urging that Victory Crew members make a supreme effort with the next few days to canvass their several districts thoroughly so that Payette county will not fall down on this last bond drive.
