Postmaster Veneable has just posted a second advertisement asking for sealed proposals for carrying the mail from Payette to New Plymouth, and Falk's Store for the term from July 1, 1905 to June 30, 1910. The present contract pays \$600 per year.

Mrs. A. M. Rowe, wife of Superintendent Rowe, of the Payette Public Schools, arrived last Saturday afternoon from Omaha where she has been visiting for a number of months with her son.

A Christmas Dance is to be given Friday night in the Elite Opera House. It is the only dance announced for the holidays in Payette and those in charge are sparing no pains to make it a great success. Reel's orchestra will furnish the music.

#### Thirty Years Ago

The following items were taken from the Payette Independent dated December 16, 1915:

Chas. Smith informs the Independent that within a week he will begin the erection of a modern business building on the vacant lot north of the E. C. Keith and Sons clothing store. The building will be 30x80, two full stories and full basement, and will be furnished with hot water heating plant. The front will be of pressed brick.
